1. COURSE DESCRIPTION
1.1. Course objectives
The goal is to familiarise students with the causes, circumstances and, most importantly, consequences of the EGL (English as a Global Language) phenomenon. Moreover, this course aims to draw students' attention to the existence of different English varieties, i.e. Englishes, as well as the presence of English in other language contexts.
1.2. Course enrolment requirements and entry competences required for the course
Erasmus students should have some background knowledge of linguistics and should be at least at the 3 rd year undergraduate level. Please consult with the course instructor directly prior to application at bdrljaca@ffri.hr .
1.3. Expected course learning outcomes
This course will familiarise students with the phenomenon of English as a lingua franca (ELF) and encourage them to investigate the implications of today's English for standard English and its ownership. Furthermore, students will be able to express and elaborate on their views on the phenomenon of English as a global language (EGL) and the impact of English on other languages, primarily Croatian.
1.4. Course content
The course deals with the development and consequences of the EGL (English as a Global Language) phenomenon. The current sociolinguistic profile of English may be viewed in terms of three concentric circles. These circles represent the types of spread, the patterns of acquisition and the functional role of

English in various cultural contexts. They are the Inner Circle, the Outer Circle and the Expanding Circle. Particular emphasis will be placed on the varieties of the English language that emerge in the Outer and Expanding Circles, as well as the notion of English as a lingua franca. Different attitudes to the phenomenon of English as a global language will be analysed. These attitudes range from neutral and positive attitudes to the perception of English through the prism of linguistic imperialism. Furthermore, emphasis will be given to the issue of domain loss, i.e. other languages losing ground to English in certain domains, particularly higher education and scientific research, which can result in diglossia.
