1. COURSE DESCRIPTION
<b>1.1. Course objectives</b>
Primary objectives are: 1. To explore social and cultural backgrounds of Canadian Literature, 2. To explore basic thematic and theoretical features of Canadian Literature, 3. To read, analyze and discuss a number of texts from Canadian Literature.
<b>1.2. Course enrolment requirements and entry competences required for the course</b>
Excellent command of written and spoken English is required
<b>1.3. Expected course learning outcomes</b>
By the end of the course, students will be able to recognize the main artistic features of Canadian writing. Furthermore, students will be acquainted with the most prominent Canadian Literature authors and their work.
<b>1.4. Course content</b>
We will first explore the historical and social background of Canadian literature and try to provide a possible periodization of Canadian Literature from the beginning to modern times. We will then focus on generic and thematic features of Canadian Literature, as well as the construction of 'typical' literary characters and settings. We will also discuss various philosophical thoughts/movements (such as activism, feminism, construction of identity, etc.) and various generic features (such as generic hybridity, multimodality, etc.) that had a significant impact on Canadian Literature. A crucial part of the teaching process is reading (mostly short) Canadian literary texts. We will read the texts ranging from the end of the 19th century to the texts published in 2021. We will analyze and discuss the read texts in classes.
