# 1. COURSE DESCRIPTION

# 1.1. Course objectives

- Familiarizing students with works, authors, art schools, and stylistic changes (and their causes) that manifested themselves in Europe in the 17th and 18th century.
- Introducing students to the history of scientific research and the recent findings emerging from the research into the aforementioned areas, as well as the particularities of the work methodology.

# 1.2. Course enrolment requirements and entry competences required for the course

• A successful completion of the following courses: Romanesque Art and Gothic Art.

# 1.3. Expected course learning outcomes

• Enabling students to identify, compare and understand particular works, authors and art schools, as well as their impact on contemporaries and younger generations.

# 1.4. Course content

• The course deals with the structural development of art history on the European and Croatian territory in the 17th and 18th century. Moreover, it offers insights into the development of Baroque architecture, sculpture and painting occurring in the aforementioned period.
